

#### PAST GOVERNOR'S THOUGHTS

It's hard to realize that there are currently almost as many Optimist members in the Iowa District as there were in the former Dakota-Manitoba-Minnesota-(Iowa) District the last year Iowa was a part of that district.

Our membership has just about doubled in the short seven year history of the Iowa District, from 1050 members at the onset to over 1900 today. We have almost reached another milestone, and hopefully will reach it yet this year. There were a sociable 25 clubs in Iowa when our Iowa District came into being in 1965. We are fast closing in on double that number at the present time. I think that it can be readily seen that the Iowa District's growth is due primarily to the chartering of new Optimist clubs throughout the state.
